the wider theoretical and political currents of their time Intended for a wide audience the book is essential reading for students on courses in art and art history It will also be useful to specialists in the field of art history and readers with a general interest in the culture and politics of the modern world Narrative painting in nineteenth-century Europe Nina Lübbren, 2023-05-23 This ground breaking book presents a critical study of pictorial narrative in nineteenth century European painting Covering works from France Germany Britain Italy and elsewhere it traces the ways in which immensely popular artists like Jean L on G r me Karl von Piloty and William Quiller Orchardson used unique visual strategies to tell thrilling and engaging stories Regardless of genre content or national context these paintings share a fundamental modern narrative mode Unlike traditional art they do not rely on textual sources nor do they tell stories through the human body alone Instead they experiment with objects spaces cause and effect relations and open ended ambiguity prompting viewers and reviewers to read for clues in order to weave their own elaborate tales I'm Not Myself at All Kristina Huneault, 2018-07-16 Notions of identity have long structured women s art Dynamics of race class and gender have shaped the production of artworks and oriented their subsequent reassessments Arguably this is especially true of art by women and of the socially engaged criticism that addresses it If identity has been a problem in women s art however is more identity the solution In this study of nineteenth and early twentieth century art in Canada Kristina Huneault offers a meditation on the strictures of identity and an exploration of forces that unsettle and realign the self Looking closely at individual artists and works Huneault combines formal analysis with archival research and philosophical inquiry building nuanced readings of objects that range from the canonical to the largely unknown Whether in miniature portraits or genre paintings botanical drawings or baskets women artists reckoned with constraints that limited understandings of themselves and others They also forged creative alternatives At times identity features in women's artistic work as a failed project at other times it marks a boundary beyond which they were able to expand explore and exult Bringing together settler and indigenous forms of cultural expression and foregrounding the importance of colonialism within the development of art in Canada I m Not Myself at All observes and reactivates historical art by women and prompts readers to consider what a less restrictive conceptualization of selfhood might bring to current patterns of cultural analysis Angels of Art Bailey Van Hook, 2004-06-11 Images of women were ubiquitous in America at the turn of the last century In painting and sculpture they took on a bewildering variety of identities from Venus Ariadne and Diana to Law Justice the Arts and Commerce Bailey Van Hook argues here that the artists concepts of art coincided with the construction of gender in American culture She finds that certain characteristics such as ideal beautiful decorative and pure both describe this art and define the perceived role of women in American society at the time Most late nineteenth century American artists had trained in Paris where they learned to use female imagery as a pictorial language of provocative sensuality Van Hook first places the American artists in an international context by discussing the works of their French teachers including Jean L on G r me and Alexandre Cabanel

Vol. 3, Nineteenth and Twentieth Centuries Metropolitan Museum of Art,1967-01-01 The Collected Essays and Criticism, Volume 2 Clement Greenberg,1986 Clement Greenberg 1909 1994 champion of abstract expressionism and modernism of Pollock Mir and Matisse has been esteemed by many as the greatest art critic of the second half of the twentieth century and possibly the greatest art critic of all time On radio and in print Greenberg was the voice of the new American painting and a central figure in the postwar cultural history of the United States Greenberg first established his reputation writing for the Partisan Review which he joined as an editor in 1940 He became art critic for the Nation in 1942 and was associate editor of Commentary from 1945 until 1957 His seminal essay Avant Garde and Kitsch set the terms for the ongoing debate about the relationship of modern high art to popular culture Though many of his ideas have been challenged Greenberg has influenced generations of critics historians and artists and he remains influential to this day

After Orientalism ,2014-11-27 The debate on Orientalism began some fifty years ago in the wake of decolonization While initially considered a turning point Edward Said s Orientalism 1978 was in fact part of a larger academic endeavor the political critique of colonial science that had already significantly impacted the humanities and social sciences In a recent attempt to broaden the debate the papers collected in this volume offered at various seminars and an international symposium held in Paris in 2010 2011 critically examine whether Orientalism as knowledge and as creative expression was in fact fundamentally subservient to Western domination By raising new issues the papers shift the focus from the center to the peripheries thus analyzing the impact on local societies of a major intellectual and institutional movement that necessarily changed not only their world but the ways in which they represented their world World history which assumes a plurality of perspectives leads us to observe that the Saidian critique applies to powers other than Western European ones three case studies are considered here the Ottoman Russian and Soviet and Chinese empires Other essays in this volume proceed to analyze how post independence states have made use of the tremendous accumulation of knowledge and representations inherited from previous colonial regimes for the sake of national identity as well as how scholars change and adapt what was once a hegemonic discourse for their own purposes What emerges is a new landscape in which to situate research on non Western cultures and societies and a road map leading readers beyond the restrictive dichotomy of a confrontation between
