Chapter One

- What advice did Nick's father give him at the beginning of the story? And how does Nick describe himself?
- 2. How does Nick describe Tom Buchanan? And how does the tone of Nick's description reveal his feelings about Tom?
- 3. Based on the description in chapter one, analyse the difference between East Egg and West Egg.
- 4. The Buchanan household seems both superficial and dysfunctional, think about this and answer the following questions:
 - a) When the phone rings at dinner, who is on the other line? Provide evidence.
 - b) How does Daisy feel about the phone call? How does she respond? Why?
 - c) How would you describe Daisy's state of mind? What are some of her inner conflicts?
 - d) Nick thinks that, given the state of their marriage, Daisy should leave Tom, but it is clear that she has no intention of doing so. What indication is there that Tom and Daisy are closely linked despite their marital difficulties?
- At the end of the chapter, Nick explains that Gatsby "stretched out his arms toward the dark water in a curious way... I glanced seaward – and distinguished nothing except a single green light..."
 - a) Based on the description given by Nick, what impression do you have of Gatsby? (use quotes to support your answer.)
 - b) Describe the impact of introducing Gatsby in that particular way at the end of the chapter.
 - c) What indications are there that the green light will have a significant impact in the novel?

- 6. How does Tom respond when Myrtle says, "Daisy! Daisy! Daisy!"? What does this reveal about Tom's personality?
- Discuss the following quote in detail:

"I was within and without, simultaneously enchanted and repelled by the inexhaustible variety of life."
