General Review:

Haya is 3 years and 5 months old. She has a global developmental delay as a residual symptom of the pilocytic astrocytoma. Her medical history was described in details in the previous report dated 05.05.06.

Haya had 28 sessions before the summer vacation and 27 sessions since Sept-06. The activities are done by presenting familiar objects, initiating her to imitate sounds and eventually gestures, encouraging her to look at pictures, etc... These means are used to develop her:

- Attention skills
- Receptive language skills
- Oral motor skills
- Expressive language skills

Current Level:

Haya is more receptive than before. She has good attendance during the sessions that last around 45 min each.

Attention skills:

Haya has shown a noticeable progress in this area. At present, she responds reflexively to sounds, she notices faces of others, she maintains eye contact with the speaker, she responds with a smile to a friendly speech, she attends to the speaker's mouth and she tries to imitate lips movements especially when she hears a familiar nursery rhyme, and she also sustains her attention in looking at toys or objects.

Receptive language skills:

Due to the fact that Haya is more interactive and cooperative than before, she seemed to have her receptive skills developed. Actually, Haya can localize the speaker, she follows few simple directions that require body movements such as "lay down" or "come to me", she recognizes her own name, she looks with interest at objects, and she reacts differently when someone is talking to her in a happy or mad tone. However, it's still hard to evaluate whether Haya understands "No" or identifies objects when named (looking at the named object or trying to reach it).

Oral motor skills:

No changes occurred in this area in spite of the blowing movement that she started to do while making soap bubbles.
