He corress a rope in his band.)

WARGRAVE, It's all come true. My Ten Little Soldiers plan-

My shome-my showe-

VERA, And chiefed screen.)

WARGRAVE. (Angrils) Silence in Court (Looks around surpclosely.) If there is any more noise, I shall have the Court cleared. (Down Right Conter.) It's all right, my dear, It's all right. Don't be trightened. This is a Court of Justice. You'll get justice here. (Crosses Left: Locks doors Left 2 and Left 1. VERA to Right. Confidentially.) You thought I was a ghost. You thought I was dead. (Above Right sods I Amendmong said I was dead. Thus was the clover part of my plan.

Said we'd trup the murderer. We'd fix up my supposed death so I should be free to spy upon the guilty one. He thought it an excellent plan-came out that night to most me by the cliff without any suspicion. I sent him over with a push-so easily. He awallowed my red boring all right.
